INFORMATION FOR CHILDREN OF DETAINED MOTHERS

How you can stay in touch with your mother

BERLIN



My mother is in prison

What does that actually mean? Your Mum has done something forbidden and now has to live in a prison for a while. By the way, the German word for prison is *Justizvollzugsanstalt* (*JVA* for short). We call it prison in this flyer.

Your Mum lives in the prison with other women.

She lives in a room there. The room is called the detention room. Most of the time she goes to work. But she also has free time, and she sleeps and eats there. What she can't do: She can't go out to visit you. And she is not allowed to use a mobile phone to send you messages and photos. But she can call you and you can visit her. But there are a few things to keep in mind.

Visit to the prison

To visit your Mum, an adult must register you. You can come together with an adult and even spend time alone with your Mum in an extra play session. However, this must be arranged in advance.

Unfortunately, you are not allowed to visit your Mum as often as you would like. A visit to the prison is very different from visiting someone at home. You have to wait at the entrance and are not allowed to walk around alone. The people who work there are in uniform. They look a bit like policemen and have lots of keys.

In the visiting room

In a prison, it doesn't look the same as at home in the living room. Sometimes there are strangers around when you meet with your Mum. Sometimes you don't know exactly what to say. Then it's nice to play a game together. Often there are a few games in the visiting room that you can try out together.

When you are older, you are already used to everyone having to wear a mask. Because of Covid, everyone has to keep their distance and it may even be that Mum has to sit behind a glass pane. It's a pity and no fun, but it has to be done to keep everyone healthy.

Lots of questions

For many children it is difficult when Mum is not there. Others in the family also have many worries now. If you don't understand something, it is good if you can ask an adult.

But you can also ask people who are specifically there to answer your questions and know what they are talking about.

To send a letter

When your Mum is in prison, you can't see her very often. But you can do that: You can write a letter. If you can't write yet, maybe an adult can help you. Your Mum will also be happy if you draw a picture!

To send the letter to your Mum, write her name and the address of the prison on the envelope, for example like this:

Name of the prison First name and surname of your Mum Street and number Zip code and city

Write your own name and address on the back. Ask an adult to help you with this.
